#### A. CALL TO ORDER

**a.** President Kaylene McDonald called the meeting to order at **6:35** pm and started the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### B. ACTION ITEMS

- a. Approve Agenda vote and pass
- b. Approve Mintues from May, 14, 2018 meeting vote and pass
- **c.** HVAC Update / Electrical Upgrade upon further research, unknowns in the power usage the cost is going to be much higher. The following options were presented to the board for review.

#### Option #1

- Description: Replace your steam boiler with a new steam boiler.
- Total Cost: \$90,000
- Pros: Cheapest option, shortest lead time for equipment, new controls would be provided to improve efficiency of the steam boiler plant.
- Cons: Still requires startup/shutdown costs each year, still requires maintenance, does not make the building more comfortable

#### Option #2

- Description: Replace steam heating system and cooling only ventilating units throughout entire building with high efficient ducted heat pump units (1 per classroom). Also requires minor electrical service upgrade.
- Total Cost: \$290,000
  - o \$225,000 for mechanical portion
  - o \$65,000 for electrical portion
- Pros: More efficient system, reliable, brand new system
- Cons: second most expensive option, requires minor electrical upgrade

#### Option #3 (current design we have worked on)

- Description: Replace steam heating system electric heaters in each classroom and hallways/restrooms. Also requires major electrical service upgrade. This is the current system we were working on.
- Total Cost: \$255,000
  - \$120,000 for mechanical portion
  - \$135,000 for electrical portion
- Pros: gets rid of steam heating system, maintains existing fan coils
- Cons: third most expensive option, requires major electrical upgrade, and operational costs are higher than other options

#### Option #4

Description: Replace steam heating system and cooling only ventilating units throughout entire building with high efficient variable-refrigerant heat pump units (multiple indoor fan coils with single outdoor unit). Also requires electrical service upgrade.

Total Cost: approximately \$350,000 (still working on getting pricing from manufacturer)

Pros: Most efficient system, very reliable, brand new system, does not require electric heaters in the classrooms

Cons: most expensive option, requires electrical upgrade (level of upgrade is not defined yet)

Very much discussion has been had about how to move forward. After stating the frustration of the estimate and how far off the quotes are from the new estimates, the board is intersted in finding the best long term and economical solution. discussion about the off setting costs of savings on gas vs extra electrical costs that would come with any new system.

The board was also made aware of the opportunity to add and new system to bring in more outside air to improve outside air quality. If a new outside air system was installed it would be upwards \$40,000-50,000. The reason this cost is so high is because of the age of the building. We need to be able to get ductwork through the outside wall which will require a structural engineer. Like I mentioned before this is not required by code but is recommended.

Spoke about the potential need to look for other heating and cooling options. Potential individual units should likely be looked at. As a board, we will put out some feelers to look for other options.

Motion was made to table the HVAC issue until further questions and proposals can be requested. Motion voted on and passed
